





My professors have profoundly impacted my passion for design. They demonstrate new ways to look at projects but also encourage me to experiment and think for myself.



My Clemson: Aside from the challenges set in class studio, one of the most rewarding experiences I've had so far during my time at Clemson was participating in a DesignBuild studio with Asheville Design Center. It was an intense learning environment that involved collaborating with other students, reaching out to the community and seeing a design all the way through from conception to construction. I even made a connection that led to a summer internship with Sitework Studios.

My Advice: It's important to have an open mind when finding what you really love to do. I jumped into landscape architecture not really knowing what I was getting into or what opportunities would come along the way. Every major has its unique challenges, but they are all worthwhile if the career path is something you enjoy. Build relationships with faculty and classmates who can push you to be your best.

My Clemson: I studied abroad in Melbourne, Australia, and loved everything about it. Before I left Clemson, my honors professors guided me through an independent research study on Australian culture and politics. After arriving in Australia, I completed the project with a paper examining the differences between my prior expectations and my actual experiences. It's amazing to look back and see how the time I spent in Australia and visiting other countries broadened my global perspective.

My Advice: Look for ways to get involved both inside and outside of the classroom. From joining a service fraternity to participating in math club to leading trips with Clemson Outdoor Recreation and Education, most of my favorite Clemson memories come from extracurricular activities where I stepped out of my comfort zone to learn new things and meet new people. The University's pursuit of excellence and acceptance of nothing less than the very best inspires me to do the same in my own life.

EXPLORE OUR TOP-TIER FACILITIES

Life Sciences Facility A 100,000-square-foot facility designed for a new era of collaborative, interdisciplinary research and education. Researchers housed in the facility represent microbiology, biochemistry, food safety and genetics.

Social Media Listening Centers Clemson's Social Media Listening Centers, built with support from Dell computers, were awarded two grants to conduct research by the National Science Foundation for better collecting, analyzing and extracting meaning from the social web.

Watt Family Innovation Center

At 70,000 square feet in size, this cuttingedge facility provides a significant amount of space for teaching and research in science, technology and engineering.

Socially responsible and technically advanced, this building was designed to teach sustainability by example and was awarded LEED Gold certification by the U.S. Green Building Council. Lee Hall houses programs in architecture and art, among others.



I chose Clemson because I wanted the team-based research and hands-on experience available through the Creative Inquiry program.



My Clemson: Being part of Creative Inquiry (CI) was the most rewarding involvement of my undergraduate years. As a result of my work with the Social and Organizational Psychology CI team, I had the opportunity to co-author two publications. I was also a member of a CI team called Tigers Together, a campus-wide suicide prevention initiative. Because of this experience, I became a suicide prevention advocacy trainer, collaborated with Healthy Campus to conduct Resident Assistant training over the summer, and participated in research on a virtual reality therapy to address anxiety and aggression in veterans.

My Advice: Take advantage of research opportunities like CI and learn how your education can have a meaningful impact on the lives of others. If you're willing to put in the time and effort, you'll feel so much more prepared for what comes after graduation. I never expected to meet some of my best friends through CI, but it was inevitable because we share the same dreams and passions.

Wy Clemson: I came to Clemson as an out-of-state student, the only person here from my high school, not knowing anybody. It was exciting to meet a group of freshmen in my major right away through the Community for Undergraduate Business Students (CUBS). We shared a residence hall and walked to classes together, and if I had any questions I could go down to the lounge and find people studying for the same exam. Now I work in the College of Business Advising Center as a student assistant, and I'm also a college ambassador, which means I get to introduce prospective students and their families to the college and to Clemson.

My Advice: Your time at Clemson will fly by, so come ready to take advantage of all the opportunities available here. It's very possible to have a balance between strong academics and an active social life. Just do the research ahead of time and get a feel for what you want to get involved in.

FINANCIAL AID Financial Aid is usually awarded on the

basis of need to supplement the amount you and your parents can contribute to your college expenses. The University also awards some scholarships based entirely on academic merit. Clemson offers financial aid in the following forms:

- grants
- scholarships
- loans
- part-time employment

The amount of need-related aid for which you are eligible is determined by the information you supply annually on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). You should start the financial aid process before the academic year in which you need assistance. No application is required for the South Carolina LIFE Scholarship. Palmetto Fellows Scholarships are available through your high school.

FEDERAL AID

The first step to receiving federal aid is to fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) online (fafsa.gov). The FAFSA must be completed to receive any federal aid (grants, loans, work study). The FAFSA priority deadline is March 1.

Federal Direct Loans

Federal Direct Loans are educational loans for which the student is the borrower.

- Maximum freshman loan amount is \$5.500.
- Part of the amount can be subsidized (interest accrues after graduation); the rest will be unsubsidized (interest accrues during school).
- Interest rate for 2016-17 is 3.76%. **Interest rates are subject to change for 2017-18.**
- · Borrower must complete entrance counseling and sign a master promissory note online at studentloans.gov.

Federal Direct PLUS Loan

Federal Direct PLUS Loans are educational loans for which the parent is the borrower.

- Maximum loan amount is up to the remaining annual cost of attendance.
- Interest rate for 2016-17 is 6.31%. **Interest rates are subject to change for 2017-18.**
- · Parent borrower must be creditworthy, complete an application and sign a master promissory note online at studentloans.gov.

SOUTH CAROLINA STATE SCHOLARSHIPS

Palmetto Fellows Scholarship

The Palmetto Fellows Scholarship is the state's premier scholarship, valued at \$6,700 for the freshman year and \$7,500 for subsequent years. In order to receive the Palmetto Fellows Scholarship, students must apply through their high school guidance counselor and meet all of the following academic requirements:

- Be ranked in the top 6% of the high school
- Score a minimum of 1200 SAT or a 27 on the ACT composite
- Earn a 3.5 GPA on the uniform grading scale

Alternative criteria for Palmetto Fellows Scholarship are:

- Score a minimum of 1400 SAT or a 32 on the ACT composite
- Earn a 4.0 GPA on the uniform grading scale

In order to renew the scholarship, students must:

- Earn 30 credit hours each academic year (fall. spring, summer)
- Earn a 3.0 GPA at Clemson University (Please note that AP/IB classes do not count in credit hours for renewal.)

LIFE Scholarship

The LIFE Scholarship is valued at \$5,000 per year. In order to receive the LIFE Scholarship. students must meet two out of three of the following academic requirements:

- Graduate in the top 30% of their high school class
- Score a minimum of 1100 SAT or a 24 on the ACT composite
- . Graduate with a minimum 3.0 GPA on the uniform grading scale

There is no application process for the LIFE Scholarship, Students will automatically be reviewed and awarded the scholarship by Clemson. To renew the LIFE Scholarship, students must:

- Earn an average of 30 credit hours per academic year (fall, spring, summer) from all colleges attended
- Earn a 3.0 GPA at Clemson University (AP/IB classes do count in credit hours for renewal.)

Hope Scholarship

The Hope Scholarship is valued at \$2,800 and is non-renewable. In order to receive the Hope Scholarship, students must graduate with a minimum 3.0 GPA on the uniform grading scale. After the initial award year, eligibility may be established for the LIFE Scholarship.

CLEMSON FRESHMAN SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarship criteria and amounts for 2017-18 are subject to change.

The Office of Admissions automatically reviews each applicant to Clemson for scholarship eligibility (no additional scholarship application required).

Freshman scholarships range from \$500 to \$15,000 per year. Test scores, class rank and GPA are all considered when awarding scholarships. Incoming freshmen must apply for admission by December 1, with the admissions process completed by December 31 to be eligible.

For Clemson University scholarship consideration for the 2017-18 academic year, both the old SAT (prior to March 2016) and the new SAT (March 2016 and beyond) will be accepted for standardized testing, as well as the ACT. Minimum test scores are subject to change from the criteria listed below, and additionally, old SAT scores will be converted section-to-section using the College Board's SAT Score Converter. Please note that the minimum test scores using the new SAT for state scholarships will be determined by state law and the SC Commission on Higher Education.

Resident Merit Scholarships

South Carolina residents who rank in the top 10 percent of their high school class and score a minimum of 1270 (EBRW+M) on the new SAT or a 27 on the ACT composite will receive a renewable scholarship of at least \$1,000.

Clemson Scholars Scholarship

The top student at each South Carolina public high school, as ranked at the end of the junior year, is awarded a renewable \$3,500 Clemson Scholars Scholarship. Selected students from independent schools are also awarded the Clemson Scholars Scholarship.

Palmetto Pact Scholarship

All students (except those already identified as Clemson Scholars) who enroll at Clemson and are awarded the Palmetto Fellows Scholarship will receive a renewable \$2,500 scholarship from Clemson.

Presidential Scholarship

Students with the Palmetto Fellows Scholarship who score a minimum of 1450 (EBRW+M) on the new SAT or a 32 on the ACT composite will receive an additional renewable scholarship of \$2,500.

Freshmen STEM Scholarship

Students with the Palmetto Fellows Scholarship who declare an approved STEM Enhancement major will receive an additional one-time freshman award of \$800. This award can be replaced by \$2,500 of state funds for the students' sophomore, junior and senior years if the student meets the requirements for the Palmetto Fellows Enhancement.

Non-Resident Merit Scholarships

Domestic out-of-state students who score a minimum of 1320 (EBRW+M) on the new SAT or a 28 on the ACT composite who are ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school class will receive a merit scholarship. Scholarships range from \$7,500 to \$15,000 annually. To maintain eligibility for non-resident merit scholarships, students must earn a 3.0 Clemson GPA and earn 24 credits per year (fall, spring, summer).

These non-resident merit scholarships will be reduced or removed for students who become South Carolina residents or receive other tuitionspecific scholarships.

Clemson Non-Resident Grant

A \$2,500 grant is available to domestic out-ofstate students who meet the following criteria:

- Score a minimum of 1320 (EBRW+M) on the new SAT or a 28 on the ACT composite
- Demonstrate substantial financial need on the
- File the FAFSA by March 1

To maintain eligibility for non-resident grants, students must earn a 2.5 Clemson GPA and earn 24 credits per year (fall, spring, summer). These non-resident grants will be reduced or removed for students who become South Carolina residents or receive other tuition-specific scholarships.

treshman Application Timeline

Recommended time frame to submit at least one set of scores for the SAT or ACT if you haven't already done so. Make sure to list Clemson to receive your scores. SAT code is 5111.

Deadline to submit high school transcripts and test scores to receive consideration for academic recruiting scholarships for fall semester (must submit application by December 1).

Dual-Enrollment and Transfer AP/IB Credits

Clemson encourages students with AP, IB and transfer credit to apply and transfer to Clemson. In 2015, 2,346 students received 39,238 semester hours of AP credits before they ever took a class at Clemson. More than 147 International Baccalaureate graduates were awarded 1,447 hours of college credit.

- · If you took college courses while in high school, be sure to send official transcripts from the institutions where you earned credit.
- Account fully for your time from high school graduation to the month you wish to enter Clemson University. If you took a leave of absence from school, please list employment location and dates.

Submit your application online today! A few hints to get you started:

- · Have your high school transcripts sent directly
- Have SAT or ACT scores sent directly from the testing service.
- · Be prepared to select different first and second choices of majors. Do not list the same major twice
- Have your credit card or checking account number (if paying by electronic check) readily available to pay the application fee online when you submit. Clemson accepts all major
- Be sure to submit the application online only. Do not send in a printed version of the online






