Narrative Summary: As a Senior Lecturer at Clemson, I usually teach four courses in the Fall Semester and four courses in the Spring semester. On four occasions, I have taught overloads for the department, teaching five courses in a semester. I have on several occasions supervised Independent studies for individual students. On two occasions, I have taught the one week summer course for rising high school juniors, which introduces them to Clemson and to Philosophy. In 2008, I was nominated for [but did not win] Clemson's Excellence in Teaching award, sponsored by the Fluor Daniel Foundation. For academic year 2002-2003 I had the duties of "Visiting Assistant Professor", and taught three courses each semester. In August 2010, I received appointment to Senior Lecturer.

Fall 2019 – Teaching 5 courses: Two sections of Logic, and three sections of PHIL 1010.
