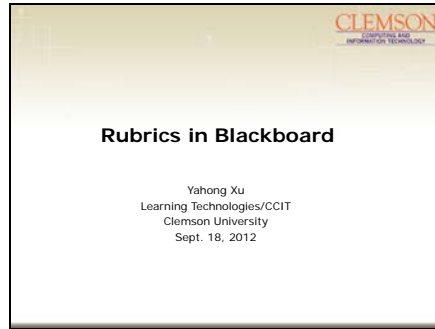


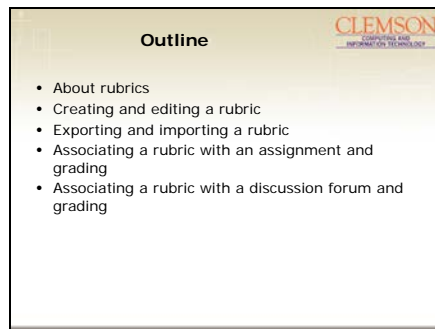

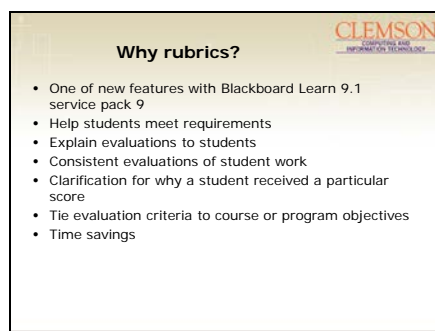

Why do we need a rubric?

It is one of new features with Blackboard Learn 9.1 service pack 9. It allows an instructor to create an interactive rubric, associate it with an assignment, discussion forum or assessment to grade, enter individual feedback or general comment or feedback.

Using rubrics helps student organize their efforts to meet requirement of an assignment or assessment, and

About Rubrics

- A list of evaluation criteria and achievement for gradable content items:
 - assignment, discussion forum, or assessment
 - blogs, wikis, journals
 - columns on the Grade Center
- Made of rows and columns
- No points, points, point range, percent, percent range

A rubric is made up of rows and columns. The rows correspond to the various criteria of an assignment, discussion board forum, or an online assessment. The columns correspond to the level of achievement expressed for each criterion. A description and point value for each cell in the rubric defines the evaluation and score of an assignment, discussion board forum, or an online assessment.

You may set up a rubric which have no point value, or have point values, point range, percent or percent range.

Using a rubric in Blackboard

Two steps:

- Step 1:
Create a rubric in your Blackboard course: Control Panel --> Course Tools --> Rubrics
- Step 2:
-- Associate a rubric with an assignment, discussion forum, assessment (short answer, essay, file response question type), wikis and blogs in content area
-- Associate a column with a rubric on the Grade Center

As to how to use a rubric in your Blackboard course, there are two steps involved.

First, you will need to create a rubric under Control Panel, click and expand Course Tools, then click on Rubrics, click Create Rubric button to create a new rubric. At this point, it is a single, stand-alone rubric, to use it for make interactive and grading purposes, next you will have to associate it with a gradable content item, such as assignment, discussion forum, or assessment.

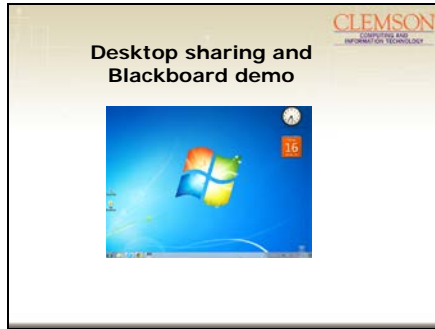

Here is a demo in a Blackboard course to show you how to use a rubric and grade items with a rubric.

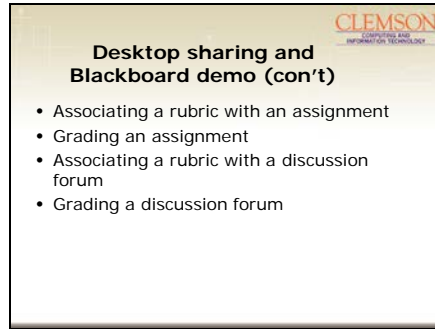
To locate rubrics, go to Control Panel, click and expand Course Tools, scroll down to click on Rubrics, click Create Rubric button to create a new rubric.

Once you create a rubric, clicking on the action link next to a rubric will allow you to edit, copy, delete or view any associated content.

Clicking on Copy will allow you to keep the settings and simply re-name the rubric.

Import and Export Rubric: If you want to move or share a rubric with another instructor, you may use this option to first export the rubric as a zip file, then go to the course where you want to import the rubric, import the zip file so you may use the same rubric in a different course.

Desktop sharing and Blackboard demo (con't)

- Associating a rubric with an assignment
- Grading an assignment
- Associating a rubric with a discussion forum
- Grading a discussion forum

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Associating a rubric with an assignment: go to a content area, click on the action link next to Assessments, select Assignment. Select from an option: Associated Rubrics, click the dropdown menu to see the choices: Select from existing rubrics, create new rubric, create from existing.

Two rubrics may be used with an assignment. The first one is for grading, the second for secondary evaluation. Select to show the rubric to students with rubric scores or without rubric scores, release the rubric after you are done with grading.

How to grade an assignment with a rubric: Locate the student attempt from the Grade Center, click the exclamation mark to view the attempt, click View Rubric button, check the radio button for each grading criteria, enter feedback to each criterion, or general feedback at the end, click Save and Exit.

Associating a rubric with a discussion forum: Go to Discussion Board, click Create Forum to set up a new forum. Select to grade discussion forum option, choose from existing rubrics, create a new one, or create from existing rubrics.

Grade a discussion forum with a rubric: click on the discussion forum, click Grade Forum, click on Grade button to view all posts, click Edit Grade to grade and enter feedback, or grading notes for instructor's reference, click Save Grade button to save the grade.
