New Electronic Doors coming soon!

We are working out the details with the Housing Office to implement a new door system for the libraries, including adding two doors for this type of use. This change is necessary because the current 3rd level west door arrangement is with the Tiger One Office which is getting out of the door business, we are their last remaining door. We think you will like the new arrangements:

3rd Level West Door — current employee entrance door

Three options are available to enter: 1) swipe ID card (just as you do now) 2) pin number 3) proxy card for patrons with disabilities. Regardless of the means you use to enter or exit, the

door will open automatically. This door will also have a digital camera for use in identification of persons without cards or pin numbers who need to be let in or out. Responsibility for letting people in and out will shift from Acquisitions to Circulation. In addition, frequent outside users (Fed Ex, FMO, etc) will be given their own "pin" numbers for entry and exit. We do not expect any change as far as use of your current ID to swipe. Your current authorized hours of access will remain the same. This door will become an "official" handicap entrance during the hours of 8:00 am to 5:00 pm, Monday - Friday.

3rd Level East Door — in the Documents area

This door will be outfitted with exterior and interior swipe and pin readers and staff may enter and exit these doors on the same access as they have for the 3rd Level West doors. The fire apparatus will be changed as well. This will be useful for staff who park on the east side of the Libraries and for Circulation staff emptying the drive-up book return in the east lot.

Handicap Door, Front Entrance

This door will be equipped with an exterior reader which will accept the swipe card, pin and proxy card. We expect to use this door after Midnight or 1:00 am (time to be determined) to limit access to the libraries in the late hours to Clemson students, faculty and staff. Other entrance doors will be locked. This is being put in place for security reasons. On this door, only the proxy card will automatically open the door, the swipe and pin access will require the user to pen the door manually.

The "Proxy" card is new to us, but used by housing for disabled students and staff. It allows the user to hold up the card in close proximity to the reader and the door will open automatically. The proxy card can be in a purse, book bag, etc and still work. We do not anticipate issuing any proxy cards to



Secure confidential documents in Word 97

Follow the instructions below:

When you create a password, write it down and keep it in a secure place. If you lose the password, you cannot open or gain access to the password-protected document. Learn about using passwords.

Open the document.

On the File menu, click Save As.

On the Tools menu in the Save As dialog box, click General Options.

In the Password to open box, type a password, and then click OK.

In the Re-enter password to open box, type the password again, and then click OK. Click Save.

Tip: If you are routing a document for review, you can allow others to make suggestions by using comments or tracked changes but still leave the document protected from other modifications. Click Protect Document on the Tools menu, and the click Tracked Changes. To let reviewers insert comments but not change the contents of the document click Comments.

Building Morale in the Workplace


Recently, Joyce Peebles and Betty Cook arose before the crack of dawn to attend a one-day workshop entitled "Building Morale in the Workplace" sponsored by the SCLA Paraprofessional Round Table. It was held in the Orangeburg, S.C. Arts Center, located in the colorful Edisto Gardens. Approximately 70 people attended from all over the state. The dynamic guest speaker was Lenell Geter, an author, trainer and motivational speaker from Columbia. A segment about him appeared on "60 Minutes" and a movie has been made about his life entitled "Guilty of Innocence, the Lenell Geter Story." In his recently released book, *Overcome, Succeed, and Prosper*, there is an underlying message which inspires, informs and encourages families and individuals to overcome their obstacles and to make personal changes in their lives by employing his system of five attitudes for success. His presentation included a couple of "teamwork" examples that got the group "vibracious." He then elaborated on ten morale busters and the consequences they produce, followed by several suggestions for increasing morale in the workplace and 13 attributes of work character. Some suggestions he sprinkled into his talk to boost morale were:

- less gossiping about co-workers
- no "organ recitals" about what body parts hurt on any given day
- being a good example to others
- leaving one's "baggage" at home
- finding something one enjoys doing

He did an excellent job of gearing his information so that the audience was able to apply it directly to their lives and work situations as library employees. Mr. Geter's three daughters accompanied him and helped sell copies of his book. (We will look into ordering a copy.) Entertainment featured solo presentations by Ms. Benita Outlaw, an accomplished singer, followed by announcements and a delicious buffet luncheon. Several lucky people won door prizes throughout the day. Although it was a long drive, networking with old friends, making new friends, and learning some valuable morale building techniques were worth the trip.—*Betty Cook & Joyce Peebles*
