## Architecture

We had a busy end-of-the-semester here in Gunnin. In April Carolina Burglar Alarm installed a security camera system for us. We have four cameras, one in the slide room, one in the print facility, one at the back copier, and one that looks at the circulation desk. The monitor is at the circulation desk and you can see all the camera areas simultaneously. We archive the security tapes for 2 weeks then start the process over.

Judy, Debi and I attended a wonderful lunch and tour of the South Carolina Botanical Garden led by Frances Chamberlain for AAH staff and affiliates. Frances led us all over the garden on a warm, sunny day in May. In addition to the site-specific, naturebased sculptures in the garden, we saw lots of poison ivy and even a snake.

This summer Debi, Judy and I are working on a project to enter approximately 2,000 items designed for the library at the Charleston Architecture Center into a database. We are using cataloging software for small libraries called "ResourceMate." Fortunately we are able to locate many records in the Library of Congress Z39.50 catalog and download them into our database. We are also assigning call number, labeling the items, and putting barcodes in them. Most of these books were gifts, some from Professor Emeritus Joe Young, others from a retired architect in Atlanta, Joseph Amisano. We plan to finish the project by August 1 so that the items can be delivered to Charleston in time for the fall semester.

The Slide Room is buried in mounds of slides that have come in as donations from Harlan McClure (dean emeritus of college of architecture) and Joe Young (professor emeritus of architecture). Harlan McClure and Joe Young are donating their extensive personal collections. Many images date back to the 1950s-1970s. Buried in slides and slides of architecture are some very interesting old images of Clemson before the lake, Clemson College, Clemson college life, and 1950s images of activities in the College of Architecture, of which all are being retained for archival purposes. Unfortunately due to poor storage conditions, a number of the slides are heavily infected with fungus and must be discarded. This week Brianne McCarthy, the history graduate student handling the initial sorting of Joe Young's collection, turned up a slide with large chunks of the emulsion eaten away, and to top it off the dead insect was found on the slide. We concluded that the bug died from over indulgence! We still have the slide with the insect on it. It may become part of a display or part of a paper on the need for

proper storage conditions.

## Special Collections

With the arrival of summer has come the departure of graduating students and the hiring of new ones. The unit continues to work on its long term processing projects, some collections have been completed. Stephanie has completed processing the

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Clemson student government records. She is also working with Professors Wayne Chapman and Frank Day on an electronic publishing project for a Clemson alumnus' manuscript about his memories as a Clemson cadet in the late 1930s. Stephanie will be identifying photographs to illustrate the work. Mike finally completed adding additions to the photograph collections that Alan Schaffer used to do his photo history of Clemson. Laurie is finishing up the Bernard Behrend Papers and Jim has completed a few loose ends to the Liberty Corporation records. Melissa continues to work with folks in the Records Center on having the Byrnes scrapbooks filmed; there have been some delays but it is hoped that they will be completed by the end of the summer.

Jim is chairing the Libraries' Disaster Recovery Group that also includes Alan and Vicki. It is meeting on a regular schedule and have heard presentations from two well known disaster recovery companies (BMS/ CAT and Munters). Further work on the Disaster Plan will occur this summer. Jim, Vicki, Melissa, Dennis, and Alan continue to work on the implementation of encoded archival description. Melissa will be first using this format/system in the Byrnes/ Brown project in order to have a searchable finding aid mounted on the web that follows current best practices. Beth and Denise recently attended a meeting of the group and Denise and Melissa are working on its implementation. Denise and Beth are also working on getting the Thurmond Speeches back online. They have not been available since December 1999.

In May, Alan and Mike visited Senator Thurmond's office up in Washington and brought back two loads of records and some artifacts. Discussions are underway regarding the closure of the office next year. Alan will be going back this August to coordinate the transfer of some more items. Estimates have been received to install HVAC and shelving in the Fumigation Room that now has some old shelving.

Susan and Will Hiott have done some revisions to the exhibit of artifacts from Fort Hill has been installed at the Strom Thurmond Institute. Susan is also mounting a new exhibit in Cooper about the history of the Clemson mascot. The Heritage Advisory Committee met in May and approved adding a number of items on to the historic objects inventory.

## Systems

In case you haven't noticed, the Libraries has no more terminals. They were all replaced by PCs in the last couple of months. A few terminals had been in use for dedicated purposes in Architecture and Circulation but even those were finally sent to surplus. It's truly the end of an era; they served us well since 1984 but technology marches on.

There are now two new (and hopefully stable) scanners at the scanning table outside Teri Alexander's office on Level 4. If these keep operating it will make a great improvement in how Richard spends his time. One of the older ones claimed way too much of Richard's talents. The scanning stations are in great demand because they are the only ones on campus that are available to the public.

The final release of NOTIS should be here within a week or so. This will be release

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7.2 and there will never be another one. The vendor says they will support NOTIS for the next 5 years but there will be few customers to test that claim. Clemson and the University of South Carolina still use NOTIS, as do some other large sites (University of Michigan, Louisiana State University and other state university libraries, the Florida Center for Library Automation for example) but all of those mentioned are actively engaged in selecting other systems. The vendor hopes that all NOTIS libraries will select Horizon, their client/server library management system.

This will be the first year since 1983 that Clemson has not been involved in a NOTIS User's Group meeting. For the past two years these meetings have been only gatherings at Mid-winter and Annual ALA meetings, instead of the dedicated 3 days meeting with 800 attendees in NOTIS' heyday. This summer is the first time that the vendor will not even set aside time at ALA for a gathering of NOTIS users. The end of another era...
