Storm Drain Marking Volunteers Needed

Does your street have storm drains? Help us let Sumter know that storm drains flow to waterways without treatment by marking the storm drains in your neighborhood. Drain markers serve as a reminder not to dump oil, trash, leaves, household chemicals or anything else down a storm drain. Storm drain marking is a great service project for neighborhood associations, school clubs, church groups or scouts. The markers are installed with an easy-to-use adhesive, and younger volunteers can assist by distributing door hangers to houses in the neighborhood. Rain Barrel Workshop

On August 15, thirteen Sumter residents built rain barrels to collect water at their homes. Using recycled soda barrels, they cut, drilled, and caulked to create fun solutions for stormwater. Rain barrels reduce the amount of stormwater flowing down streets and ditches, and provide free water that can be used for irrigation, indoor plants, rinsing tools, and more.
