WHAT IS AMERICA READS?

In 1997, President Bill Clinton recommended that Federal-Work study students should serve as reading tutors to help all children read at a proficient level before the end of their third grade term. Research showed that with attention to detail and individualized structure, young students benefited from personal tutors and showed increased reading proficiency.

Clemson University decided to join the initiative and develop a program during the academic year of 1997-1998. The program is composed of Clemson University students and strong leadership who continue to carry out the mission of the program. America Reads at Clemson University is currently partnered with the following schools: Clemson Elementary and West End Elementary to assist students kindergarten to third grade.

Director Spotlight

Brittany Beeker:

Originally from Lincolnton, North Carolina, Brittany Beeker attended Western Carolina University for undergraduate with a major in Middle Grades Language Arts and Science Education. After earning her degree, Beeker was a dog trainer for over a decade. Moving to South Carolina, Beeker attended East Carolina University's Master's in Library Science Program virtually, while simultaneously teaching 7th grade science. After graduating, Beeker became a children's librarian in Clarendon County, SC. Now pursuing a PhD in literacy at Clemson University, Beeker has been the Director of America Reads for the past two years, and is also a Graduate Teaching Assistant in Clemson's College of Education! Outside of the classroom, Beeker enjoys taking her dog, Dolly, to visit migrant shelters on the Mexican border.

Fascinated by Beeker's story, our team decided to ask her some questions regarding the America Reads program and her role:

Q: What do you hope young students gain from this program?
A: "More than anything else, I hope students in this program learn to love reading. So many kids seem to view reading in such a negative way, but we all read all day everyday, even when we don't realize it, so it is an essential skill to have. I hope they can begin to see reading as the beautiful activity that it is instead of something they just have to do for school."

Q: What is your favorite thing about America Reads?
A: "There are two things I love about America Reads: the tutors and the students. When you add them together, it is amazing because watching them interact each session is pure magic. The tutors and students form such a special bond and it is truly enjoyable to watch them work together. The tutors really get to know their students and learn about their likes and dislikes, what motivates them, and how they learn."

- Q: What lasting impact do you hope to leave behind for young students?
 A: "I would love for the students in our program to gain confidence in their reading and writing skills. Each student in our program has strengths I want them to recognize and celebrate instead of focusing on the skills they struggle with. I think it is important for students to remember that we all grappled with literacy skills at some point in our lives, so their struggles are not unique. None of us were born knowing how to read and those skills come easier for some than they do for others. Everyone has skills they need to work on or skills they grasp easily and neither of those is bad or wrong."


Q: How did you feel when you got reelected?


Q: What is your favorite thing about America Reads and why is it important?






